CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Even though this past year we have suffered a lot of cuts within the programs we administer through the Bureau of Indian Affairs, this has been a real good year for the Tribe.

The Executive Committee of the Iowa Tribe has realized the program funds are going to be cut more. We have known for a long time if we were going to exist as a Tribe, alternate sources of finances had to be sought. This is the approach we have undertaken. So far, the Enterprises we have started, such as, the Service Station and the Bingo Operation have been successful. Hopefully they will continue to do so.

As Chairman of the Iowa Tribe, I would like to take this opportunity to thank each of you for comments, thoughts, and your encouragement this past year. It certainly helps.

I would also like to thank the Executive Committee for their effort they have put forth in developing a sound respectful organization. Their support has also helped a great deal.

Last but not least, I would like to thank each and every employee of the Tribe for their contribution to the organization. The employees play an awlfully big part in making things happen.

We have our share of problems, like any other business. The organization, from its Executive Committee to the Tribal Members, down to the employees, I'm extremely proud of, and hope you will be also.

COMMUNITY HEALTH REPRESENTATIVE

Jean Farley, who has been employeed with the Iowa Tribe as Community Health Representative, has resigned her position.

Jean has been employeed with us for the past 8 years.

She will be moving to Independence, Missouri shortly. We wish her good luck in her move!

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT

The Iowa Tribe has just recently been awarded a grant in the amount of \$200,000 for the construction of a fire station, a tank truck, and fire fighting equipment.

The fire station will be located in the industrial area, just west of the service station. It will be an all volunteer fire department, with training provided to all.

Hopefully, we can begin construction at the end of September.

SERVICE STATION IMPROVEMENTS

Due to the fact the service station business has grown so rapidly, we are adding another gas pump. Also, a room addition to 20 feet is presently being built. This will accommodate a tire repair machine, plus some storage area.

The business at the station has by far exceeded our expectation, of course we are extemely thrilled about it. This project was funded through the Bingo Plan Account.

RODEO NEWS

The 2nd Annual Rodeo was held on the Reservation this past June, with the attendance nearly doubling over last year.

We would like to thank all the people who volunteered their help these 2 days. It takes a whole lot of work in putting on a rodeo and these volunteers work very hard in helping us out. We want you to know that we sure appreciate yourhelp!

LAND PURCHASE

The Tribe has recently signed a contract to purchase 120 acres from the family of the late Cecil Wright.

This land is on the state line in Nebraska. It joins the land formerly occupied by the late George and Edith Rhodd.

We are pleased to add this land to our base acres. The purchase price was \$55,000. The land appraised at \$65,000. There was \$30,000 left in the Land Purchase Account that

was set aside from the per capita funds. This money will be used to pay for the land with the remaining balance paid from the Bingo Plan Account.

According to the abstract, the father of George Ogden Sr., (a member of the Executive Committee) once owned this piece of land.

Burial Assistance in the amount of \$250.00 is provided through the Tribal Budget and \$500.00 is provided through the Bingo Plan Account for a total of \$750.00.

NEWS LETTER

Most of the Indian Tribes in the United States have made the transition and adaptation to fit in with the majority culture a few tribes still dominated by "traditionlists" seem fairly conspicious by comparison. As is true nearly everywhere, most tribes have their conservative or Bld guards" groups, which would perfer to see nearly everything left pretty much as it is.

For this reason many Indians have had to move away to find jobs and to live in less primitive surroundings. They will return not only for visits but to stay, if and when living condition and job opportunities are adequate on the reservations.

Historically speaking, this is the long-awaited time of transition when the Indians finally take over the management of their own affairs. Self-determination is the governments official policy, which is exactly what nearly all Indians want it to be.

What makes this transition difficult is the dishearting time-lag when qualified Indians seek job opportunities on the reservations. The long-neglected economic development of reservation resources could be blamed. This factor and others have resulted in the all-important shortage of jobs "at home" where the Indian perfer to live.

This time-log has been felt most painfully by young Indians who have been talked into going away to attend technical schools. They finish their training and obtain certificates attesting to their qualifications as heavy equipment operators, auto mach, welders and other such occupations, only to find out there are no jobs available in their newly acquired skills - at least not onthe reservation.

Tribal programs designed to benefit Indians have been viewed by the Indian themselves with some sceptcism for understandable reasons. Too often these undertaking have been worked but by tribal officials to the Indians on a "take it or leave it" basis.

With this in mind the Native Corporation was formed, looking at Indians that are proving to be resourceful and cooperative in planning and carring out programs of economic development, which are alert to opportunities and are constantly looking for new sources of support and guidance, especially when venturing into new fields involving risks and challenges. It is a time of trial-and-error, of learning from the experience of others who ventured into the same fields. What the Indian people has wanted was the right of self-determination, to chart his own goals and to try to carry out his own programs with a minimum of outside guidance or interfernece. Now he has that right, there are abundant resources, largely undeveloped, waiting to be made productive and profitable.

Indiana University has established a Minority Summer Faculty Recruitment Fellowship Program to aid in recruiting outstanding minority faculty to its Bloomington campus. I seek your help in making this opportunity known to Native Americans.

Our office is currently searching for potential candidates from a wide variety of disciplines to teach during the 1988 second (eight week) summer session. A central goal of the Fellowship program is to assist chairpersons and deans in identifying minority scholars who might be available for longer-term positions.

The fellowship package includes a summer salary equivalent to that ordinarily paid to an Indiana University faculty member of the same rank plus a \$2,500 stipend. Individuals nearing completion of the doctorate and those who have completed the Ph.D. within the last four years are now being considered.

Please share the information about our fellowship program with members of your tribe who might be interested in applying. We seek candidates who have demonstrated a strong commitment to scholarly research and creative teaching. If you know of potential candidates, and would be willing to share with us their names and addresses, we would be happy to write to them directly, inviting them to apply to the program.
